Proposed Assessment Plan

The MENG Program Director will coordinate with the faculty of each emphasis area to develop a single, flexible assignment that will be given to each student near the end of their program. Each department/program will decide which course or courses will include the assignment. The instructor will grade each assignment with a standard rubric and forward a copy of the assignment and the rubric to the ENMG Program Director each semester. The Program Director will meet with the program directors of each emphasis area to review the assignments/scores and develop program recommendations.

Ideas for the assignment: Self-reflective essay? A case study addressing both technical and management aspects? A SHORT technical article or report? Other???

Potential rubric for scoring

Effective communication	Communication is clear, professionally phrased, and virtually free of grammatical errors.	Communication is understandable, but falls somewhat short in clarity, professional phrasing, or grammar.	Communication is unclearly written with frequent errors, or lacks professional style.
