# Humanities & Social Sciences Department, South Dakota Mines

**Computers & Society (HUM 375)**, instructor of record, (Fall 2019, *Fall 2020*, Fall 2021, Spring 2023, Fall 2023)

Upper-level Humanities course that examines the social impact of computers with emphasis on the development of computers, the cultural impact of computers, and the question of values and social responsibility individually and collectively. Enrolls up to 30 students.

# Communication in the STEM Workplace (ENGL 279), instructor of record,

(Fall 2019, Spring 2020, Spring 2021, Fall 2021, Spring 2022, Fall 2022, Fall 2023)
Introductory course emphasizing written and oral forms of communication in the STEM workplace. Students prepare correspondence, resumes, short reports, graphics, & presentations commonly used in science and engineering fields. Enrolls up to 24 students.

Characters Across Storyworlds, Special Topics in English (ENGL 392), instructor of record, (Fall 2023) Special topics course in which students analyze fictional characters across time periods, platforms, and media—including short stories, novels, radio, comics, film, and TV. The class considered how characters who appear across media challenge notions of personhood and authority.

# Serial Storytelling: From the Victorian Novel to the Internet, Special Topics in English (ENGL 392), instructor of record, (Spring 2019)

Special topics course in which students analyzed narratives across time periods, platforms, and media—including novels in parts, radio, comics, film, TV, and the internet. The class considered how audiences experience time, routine, memory, character, and community through these serial forms, as well as how the stories change over time and historical period. Enrolls up to 30 students.

Introduction to Literature (ENGL 210), instructor of record, (Fall 2021, Spring 2022)

Introductory course featuring readings in fiction, drama, and poetry to acquaint students with literature and aesthetic form. Designed to acquaint students with the critical study of literature and increase their enjoyment of reading. Enrolls up to 30 students.

## British Literature 1800-Present (ENGL 222), instructor of record, (Spring 2018)

Chronological survey of British literature from 1800 to present, emphasizing major art and literary movements in the context of global empire and decolonization. Enrolls up to 35 students.

Connections: Humanities & Technology (HUM 200), instructor of record, (Fall 2017, Spring 2019, Fall 2020, Spring 2021)

Students read and respond to a variety of texts stressing the relationship between technology and Humanities disciplines. Class discussions focus on the development, social impact, and ethical dimensions of major technologies. Enrolls up to 30 students.

**Introduction to Humanities (HUM 100),** instructor of record, (*Spring 2020* \*hybrid semester due to pandemic) Introductory level Humanities class themed on narrative approaches to medicine and experiences of health. Enrolls up to 30 students.

English Composition I (ENGL 101), instructor of record, (Fall 2017, Spring 2018, Spring 2019, Fall 2019, Fall 2020, Fall 2022, Spring 2024)

Students practice the skills in research and documentation needed for academic writing by analyzing a variety of academic and non-academic texts and rhetorical examples based on the course theme of Materialism in American Society. Enrolls up to 24 students.

# The Early British Novel, Origins to 1830, instructor of record, (Autumn 2016)

Upper-level English major students read six eighteenth century novels and learn to identify key historical, political, and market influences on the rise of the novel. Enrolls up to 30 students.

# Introduction to Popular Culture Studies, instructor of record, (Autumn 2014)

Students historically contextualize popular culture from the nineteenth century to the present and learn how to academically analyze popular culture. Enrolls up to 45 students.

# **Business and Professional Writing**, instructor of record, (Spring 2014)

Students practice genres of professional writing in print and digital formats. Students produce marketing proposals for a non-profit organization. Enrolls up to 24 students.

# British Literature 1800-Present, teaching assistant for Dr. Robyn Warhol, (Autumn 2013)

Students gain broad knowledge of British literature in the English-speaking world from the colonial to the post-colonial period, emphasizing diverse global contexts. Responsible for two recitation sections of up to 40 students each.

## Second Year Writing: American Literature Section, instructor of record,
